Rubber Skill Development Council has initiated the project, Saamarth – Empowering Millions lives in Rubber in Nov 2018. It aims at up-skilling and reskilling the masses, in tyre service and natural rubber plantation sector, and people employed in various rubber manufacturing units across the country.

Under the esteemed Saamarth project of RSDC, RSDC's affiliated training partners have launched Mobile Skill Van across states, to increase the reach on ground particularly for the Job role of Tyre Service & Maintenance- Tyre Fitter, which is spread across the highways, villages, towns and cities. Instead of a classroom training, these specially developed mobile skill vans are fitted with the necessary equipment and manned by the trained staff to move across state and national highways, villages and towns are reaching out to the tyre mechanics across country to assess them on skills acquired and also certify them.

RSDC has successful reskilled and certified I Lac tyre fitters during 2019-20 year under the Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL) component of Pradhan Mantri Kaushal Vikas Yojana (PMKVY) covering II9 districts across 21 states with 40 mobile vans.

A series of Mobile Skill vans have been launched with a view to move them across different state highways, villages and towns, creating awareness about skill requirement for tyre service and maintenance and safety on roads associated with the upkeep of the tyres. The mobile vans were flagged off in cities like Lucknow, Kerala, Kolkata, Guwahati and Shillong.

"Companies would have to run operations with nearly 30% less workforce which is only possible with well trained and extremely efficient workforce. Therefore, skill training is going to play a major role in the coming future."

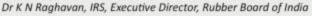

"Rubber Board is embarking on two projects to overcome the COVID-19 challenges; first, an incubation centre is being set up where technical advice, consultancy, testing facilities etc will be provided. Second is entrepreneurship - Rubber Board has started a programme for adopting untapped plantations so that returnees from Middle East countries could become entrepreneurs."







"Rubber Industry is a labour-intensive sector which is expected to recover in a year's time. We need to spend resources now for a trained manpower so that when normalcy returns, and the companies are ready with a skilled manpower."

"Going forward, capital cost will be lower than the labour cost. Locally available labour force who will need to be reskilled would probably come at a higher cost. Also, companies which require manpower could attract apprentices as the government is funding the stipend partly."
